Opening Acclamation and Collect for Purity

Celebrant Blessed be God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



Every service of the **Eucharist**, or Mass, is divided into two sections: the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of Holy Communion. The first section borrows from Jewish synagogue patterns of readings, teaching & prayer. The second section is a gathering – a literal a "re-membering" - of the Body of Christ around the table of Christ as we celebrate the Last Supper. Jesus instructed us to, "do this in remembrance of me" (Lk 22:19).

This opening prayer, or **Collect**, is meant to gather themes from the current season, scripture readings, or experiences of our lives, and to incorporate all of them into our journey toward Eucharistic fellowship with God.

Today's **First** Reading tells of Jonah's grudging obedience to God's second call to go and prophesy. Nineveh's military aggression and spiritual depravity are the source of Jonah's resistance. He cannot believe that God would forgive such wicked enemies, yet the serious message underlying Jonah's humorous story is God's stunning offer of forgiveness to all from the sinister Ninevites to selfrighteous Jonah.

Today's **Psalm** is a grateful response to God's aid in a time of trouble. God's people are encouraged not to trust in status or wealth, but rather God's steadfast love and justice for all.





"Hosanna!" is the song of pilgrims who welcomed Jesus to Jerusalem on Palm Sunday (Matt. 21:9). We join with both the angels of heaven and all those looking for God's deliverance in our world.

Bread and wine are

offered in remembrance of the Last Supper in which Jesus took bread and wine and gave to his disciples, instructing them to "do this in remembrance of me."

At the **altar** we offer ourselves to God, allowing ourselves to be broken & shared, like bread and wine, for the world. Finally, we receive the bread & wine – the Body & Blood of Christ – our spiritual food & drink, which unites us to Christ and his risen life.






